### Dick Newman

The first president of our congregation, Richard Newman, died last month, after a five year struggle with Parkinson's disease. He was the beloved husband of Mary Ann Newman, loving father of Susan Schuepbach of Vallejo; Daniel Newman and wife Sherry of Corona; and Carolyn Newman and her husband Ed Lisieski of Bainbridge Island, Washington; grandfather of Luna and Olivia Schuepbach, Steven and Bill Newman, and Simon and Arlo Lisieski. Richard Newman is also survived by sister Carol Landau and husband Jack, as well as nine nieces and nephews.

Dick Newman grew up in Cleveland Heights, Ohio and graduated from Heights High. He was a World War II veteran. He graduated from the University of Michigan with BBA degree and practiced accounting for seven years before becoming a teacher; a profession that he loved. He taught Mathematics in high schools in Oakland and Mill Valley. Dick remembered his twenty six years at Tamalpais High School fondly for the many wonderful friends, colleagues, students and community members with whom he had the opportunity to work. During the years of teaching he earned his MS from the University of Utah and PhD. from U.C. Berkeley.

One major influence in Dick's life was a summer he spent in Israel in 1950 after graduating from Michigan. He maintained a lifelong interest in the Middle East and was always hopeful for peaceful solutions to the issues in that region.

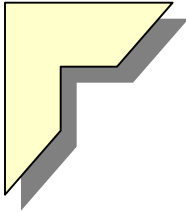
After retiring he and his wife, Mary Ann, planned and led twelve study tours to Europe, ten of them to Switzerland where they had lived for a year while he was Academic Dean at TASIS (The American School in Switzerland) near Lugano. The Newman family lived for thirty years in Mill Valley and later he and Mary Ann moved to Sonoma where they lived for eighteen years before coming to Spring Lake Village in Santa Rosa. In all of these communities he was an active leader and volunteer.

In Sonoma, he was a founder and the first president of our congregation. This newsletter editor learned much from Dick in the early years of our congregation. He was a patient advisor to these pages. Many productive, happy hours were spent in meetings and gatherings at the warm, comfortable Newman house, where Dick presided over our first Long Range Planning Committee, during book group discussions, and family *simchas*. We were so lucky to have you among us, and you are greatly missed, Dick.

Mary Ann suggested that if you wish to make a donation in Dick's memory she thought it would please him to make it to Congregation Shir Shalom.

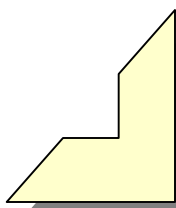

to the Jewish Model of the Four Worlds  
with Richard Lenson***

**Monday, May 10<sup>th</sup>**

7-9 p.m.

In the classroom

Jewish mystical literature discusses four worlds that we inhabit simultaneously. These are 1. the world of Divine emanation, 2. the world of creation, 3. the world of formation, and 4. the world of physical action. In psychological terms these four worlds can be considered the worlds of 1. spirit, 2. intellect, 3. emotion and 4. the physical world, respectively.

The four worlds model has practical insights into how we view and interact with the world. The model provides insights into Torah, in the four children paradigm told at Pesach, into the process of creativity, and into our inertia in making changes in our life.

Each world, in the Jewish tradition, has a soul connection to God. Some speak of the four souls, one for each world. There is discussion of a fifth world, with its own soul. This is the soul that is referred to when one speaks about the extra soul given on Shabbat. We will discuss this fifth world, also.

In this one evening class we will discuss the four worlds, the four soul points of connection, some cross cultural perspectives on these different worlds, different ways of connecting to God from each world perspective, some psychological insights this model provides, and some practices that can help us find our soul connection in each world. We will look at Torah and the siddur (prayerbook) for examples of this four world model. And we will briefly see how the Kabbalistic Tree of Life model incorporates this four world model.

## Shir shalom school news From Susan Jebrock

As we move into another lush green Sonoma spring season, we observe Pesach and celebrate the exceptional freedoms we enjoy as Jewish Americans in this place and time.

As educators and parents we are privileged to pass on the beauty and meaning of Jewish customs and rituals to our children. Jewish education enables children to experience a connection to the past, to appreciate the freedom from oppression, hunger, and deprivation they enjoy in the present, and to become inspired to improve the world so that all people have better lives in the future. I was personally inspired to become a Jewish educator by Dick Newman, the first president of Congregation Shir Shalom, who died on March 14 at the age of 83.

I was interviewed for the position of Director of Education in the Fall of 1996. When Dick Newman called to tell me that I had the job, he said that he was particularly impressed by my statement that I believed that children need to feel the sense in their lives that "there is something bigger than themselves." I have never forgotten this, because I thought this very general and somewhat trite statement might show my lack of experience teaching Judaism, and I had been embarrassed that it was all I could come up with when asked about why I wanted the job. But Dick Newman, even with his many years of experience as a professional educator and administrator, always saw past the surface details to the heart and soul of a situation.

He was one of the most intelligent, knowledgeable, modest, kind, respectful and universally loved and respected men I have ever known. We were so fortunate to have his wisdom, skill and dedication in the formative years of our congregation. Our love goes out to Mary Ann, who also contributed to our congregation and school in so many ways, to Susan Schuepbach, who was one of our first teachers in the school, and to the rest of the Newman family.

Shabbat School classes this month are on **April 9** and **April 23**. The Family Shabbat and pot luck supper will be on **April 9**. **With My Compliments**

Ever since I was a little girl I've taken great joy in telling people something nice about themselves (but only, of course, if that nice thing is true). When I was a preteen I was with my mother at a theatre production; we were in the women's room during intermission and I looked up to see a woman with the most glorious naturally red mane in the known universe. I couldn't help myself: "You have the most *beautiful* hair," I gushed. Her entire demeanor changed - she smiled, she relaxed, and she glowed, all at once. From that moment, I was hooked on giving compliments. (Not to be confused with praise and attention, which I wrote about for the January newsletter.)

I know how she felt. Getting a compliment is so cool that I actually remember my first: I was just a little girl, buying something at a local store. The woman clerk said, "You have such beautiful skin! What do you use?" (Truthfully, it was the not-very-glamorously named Noxzema, which Wikipedia says started life in 1914 as "Dr. Bunting's Sunburn Remedy.")

The most creative compliment I ever received came about 30 thirty years later: I was at a café in Santa Rosa, enjoying my meal and my book, when a man walked by and said, "You look so pretty when you're reading!" I was so shocked that when I got home I stood in front of the mirror with a novel, trying to catch glimpses of myself mid-sentence. ("Hmmm, who goes better with my eyes, Fitzgerald or Rand...?")

I could tell he really meant what he said, which is the essence of compliment competence. Flattery, we've been cautioned, will get you nowhere. Flattery applies to insincere compliments, but Webster says it can also apply to excessive compliments. To which I say, Really? Is there such thing as "too many compliments"? And, if so, what is the cut-off point? Can you give someone four a week but the fifth one sets off alarms? In my entire life, I don't ever recall saying to anyone, "Okay, buster, that's one too many nice things you've said to me."

There are, however, some people who feel uncomfortable with a compliment and don't know what to say ("thank you" is the only reply necessary). Taking a compliment graciously is as much an art as delivering one. And delivery is a simple formula: When you notice something special about a person, point it out. Of course, drawing attention to someone can be rude, so be tactful and brief. And, remember, a compliment doesn't only (or ever!) need to be about appearance. How about, "Your telephone manners are so beautiful," or "You have such great taste in birthday cards!"

We all need complimenting. In the words of the philosopher Philo, "Be kind, for everyone you meet is fighting a hard battle." Telling a war-weary friend that she makes the best pot roast ever can make her day. In fact, you compliment *me* just by reading this. And did anyone ever tell you how attractive you are when you read?
